


Japan's Cooperation with Jordan



Japan and Jordan their established diplomatic relations in 1954. Since then, the two countries have been maintaining friendly bilateral relations, including ties between historical the imperial and royal families and high-level visit active exchanges.

Jordan is the 'cornerstone of peace and stability' in the Middle East, and Japan highly values its political economic resilience. which contributes greatly to the stability of the wider Middle East region. This is reflected in the upgrading of bilateral relations between the countries to strategic partnership in 2018. Since then, and Jordan Japan accelerated the expansion of their cooperation across a broad range of areas, including political, economic, security, and cultural fields.

Jordan has long accepted from neighboring refugees countries due to its political and geographical contexts. However, the influx of refugees from Syria following outbreak of the Syrian crisis in March 2011 has placed a significant social and economic burden on Jordan. Moreover, ongoing regional instability has further strained Jordan's economy.

addition. Jordan's continued need for external scarce support, natural resources, particularly water and energy, as well as the lingering effects the COVID-19 pandemic constrained Jordan's progress.

In order to respond to the economic difficulties. the Government ofJordan launched the Economic Modernization Vision in June 2022, aiming to drive growth, stimulate investment, create sustainable jobs. The realization of these goals, however, is closely tied to regional dynamics. While developments renewed Syria could offer economic opportunities, Jordan continues to view strengthened border control, counter-terrorism, and overall security as essential stability and progress

Understanding Jordan's important role in regional stability and peace, Japan will continue to support Jordan's modernization efforts and selfsustaining economic growth through its ODA. development encompassing policy loans, grant aid, and technical assistance, covering priority sectors such as energy and water.

1. ODA Loans

ODA Loans support developing countries by providing concessional, longterm, low-interest funds to finance their development efforts, particularly for the development of economic and social infrastructure, such as transportation, energy, water, and telecommunications. The fundamental role played by ODA loans as a form of aid is to complement a country's domestic resources needed for development. The sectors covered by ODA loans differ according to the recipient country's needs and development strategies. Japan has been providing ODA loans to Jordan for a time, supporting long priority sectors including water, energy, and social resilience.

Assistance through Japanese NGOs

Japan provides support for Japanese NGOs to implement economic and social development projects, as well as to deliver emergency humanitarian assistance to refugees in Jordan and their host communities.



Through Grant Assistance for Japanese NGO Projects, WVJ supported improvement of an inclusive educational environment, especially for vulnerable children including out-of-school children, refugee, and children with disabilities, through providing English and life-skills classes, barrier-free facilities, and accessible teaching materials.

3. Technical Cooperation

Technical Cooperation is a form of development cooperation that facilitates the transfer of technology and knowledge necessary for the economic and social development of developing countries. Japan has supported Jordan since 1965 through receiving trainees, dispatching experts, and implementing various cooperation programs. So far, Japan has provided cooperation equivalent to 42,014 million Yen, involving 1,220 Japanese experts and 3,292

4. Corridor for Peace and Prosperity


In 2006, Japan proposed the "Corridor for Peace and Prosperity" initiative in cooperation with relevant partners to promote regional economic collaboration and mutual prosperity. As part of these efforts, Japan has supported the establishment of the Jericho Agro-Industrial Park (JAPI) in the West Bank, where Palestinian enterprises are providing employment opportunities and producing value-added goods for export. Japan also promotes regional human resource development through third-country training programs hosted by Jordan. While some of these programs for Palestine, contribute to the Corridor for Peace and Prosperity initiative, other training programs for Iraq and Yemen aim to support stability and development across the broader region.



5. Support Through International Organizations

Japan, through international organizations, provides assistance in response to the large

number of Syrian refugees who have fled to Jordan.
